
Inside you will find up-to-date information on each of the major

FIGHTING FLOODING

As part of the Stormwater Management Plan for Kadina, Council is improving the water storage capacity and quality with an upgrade to the Gurner Street detention basin. Approximately 1500m3 of soil will be removed from site, increasing the water capacity of the basin and helping to alleviate flooding along South Terrace. Council also undertook soil samples to ensure soil quality is within EPA guidelines.

NEW SEWER LINE DESIGN

Council's internal engineer has designed a new sewer line to run through Lawrence Street (Drain Road to Olive Parade) as the current septic soakage pits in the area are deteriorating. The new line will collect sewerage from 19 allotments along Lawrence Street and six on Drain Road, with Council's Civil Construction Team to install the new line in 2024. The planned line includes a 'stub' for future connections, as well as a new footpath and road upgrade. Communications with the affected residents will occur in early 2024 regarding connecting to the system.



Important works have also been undertaken at Wallaroo Holiday Park to improve its waste management system.

This includes the installation of a new pump station and holding tanks. The installation of these items required deep excavation, using shoring boxes and cranes to lower the tanks and increments into and place, then backfilling. The upgrade is scheduled to completed next year.



FEELING THE PINCH?

As the cost of living pressures continue to impact Australian households, it's important to know what help is available to you.

Council staff are here to support you if you are having difficulty paying your rates. Weekly and fortnightly payment plans can be put in place, helping you to pay your rates in a manageable way and not get behind. For more information contact Council Staff on 8828 1200 Option 4.

There is also a suite of South Australian Government concessions available to people/homeowners.

Energy Bill Relief

Up to \$500 per year towards an electricity bill for people who hold an eligible card or receive an eligible Centrelink payment.

Cost of Living Concession

Up to \$243.90 per year for homeowneroccupiers, self-funded retiree homeowners-occupiers and tenants for people who hold an eligible card or receive an eligible Centrelink payment.

Energy Bill Concessions

Up to \$263.15 per year for people who hold an eligible card or receive an eligible Centrelink payment.

SA Concessions Energy Discount Offer - Origin Energy

SACEDO includes a guaranteed, ongoing 17% off electricity usage and supply charges for people who receive the Energy Bill Concession.


Water and Sewerage Rate Concession

Up to \$359.70 per year for people who own or rent their principal place of residence and pay for water and hold an eligible card or receive an eligible Centrelink payment.

Emergency Services Levy (Fixed Property) Remission

Up to \$46 per year for people who hold an eligible card or receive an eligible Centrelink payment.

Australian Cornish Mining Sites: World Heritage Bid

Last month, World Heritage consultant, Barry Gamble, arrived in South Australia to progress and bring awareness to the Australian Cornish Mining Sites: Burra & Moonta World Heritage bid – a potential game changer for the region.

Council hosted a community information session at Moonta Town Hall with Barry and National Trust SA, with roughly 40 people listening to updates regarding the World Heritage bid as well as National Trust SA projects on site – both current and future to maintain and restore where necessary and increase interpretation opportunities.

Following the meeting, Barry met with the local National Trust SA branch and the Nharangga Aboriginal Progress Association, providing rich two-way conversations that will be invaluable in building community support of the project going forward.

Barry and consortium members also had discussions with a number of key stakeholders, including Heritage SA; advisors to the Minister for Climate, Environment and Water; First Nations people; the Ngadjuri and Nharangga boards and associations; local communities; the Adelaide Economic Development Agency; Regional Development Australia Yorke and



Mid North; PIRSA; the South Australian Tourism Commission; the Kernewek Lowender committee and others.

Barry's visit and subsequent community, industry and government discussions supported by the work of the consortium has ensured the bid will be in a state of readiness

for nomination swiftly following the tentative list submission, hopefully in the first quarter of 2024.

Remember your P's, Please!

We need to talk to you about your loo. Just because something can be flushed, it doesn't mean it should be. We see a lot of strange things coming through to our sewage treatment plants – things that should have been put in the bin, instead of flushed down the toilet.

- Wet wipes don't disintegrate when flushed even the ones labelled as 'flushable'.
- Wipes can cause blockages in your household plumbing, potentially costing you up to \$1000 in plumbing bills.
- When they meet up with another nasty that's commonly washed down the sink – cooking fat – they create the perfect combination for a blockage in the sewage network.

- They jam pumps and get caught in equipment at our sewage treatment plants.
- They add to the overall cost of sewage treatment because they must be screened out, dumped in bins and trucked off to landfill – which is where they should go in the first place.

Many bathroom products also cause blockages in the sewer and at our treatment plants because they don't break down.

- Hair balls from hairbrushes clump with all the other nasties in the sewer and can cause blockages.
- Cotton buds are made of plastic and end up looking like lollipop sticks in our sewer system. They can sneak through the tiny holes in our filters and hold up

the treatment process.

- Cotton wool balls stay like wet clumps and can add to blockages.
- Dental floss might look innocent but it gets tangled in our equipment.
- Tampons and sanitary pads are a big contributor to blockages in our network.
 They're designed to absorb liquid and don't break down in our pipes.

What you can do

- Only flush the three P's pee, poo and paper.
- Use a bin in your bathroom for everything else.
- Don't fall victim to misleading labels on wet wipe packaging – even though they may say they're 'flushable', they don't break down in the sewer like toilet paper.



Financial Summary

The table to the right is a summary of the audited financial results of Council for the past two years and the adopted budget for 2023-24. Council reported an operating surplus (before capital adjustments) in 2022/23 of \$4,866,207 compared with an original budgeted deficit of \$795,295. The operating surplus was due to a number of factors with the most material being the advance payment of the financial assistance grant of \$2,666,459 which is recognised in Grants, Subsidies and Contributions. The Commonwealth Government during June 2023 forwarded to Councils their funding under the Financial Assistance Grants Scheme, 75% (\$2,666,459) of their 2023/24 allocation. Under the accounting standards this income is to be reported in the year of receipt and therefore inflates the Grants, Subsidies and Contributions received for the 2022/23 financial year and also will impact on the 2023/24 year if this distribution method is not

Investment income was above budget and this was due to grant funds received in advance not yet spent held on investment, which has increased the actual interest received. In addition to this the interest rates on deposits have increased significantly over the 12 month period.

Employee expenditure remained fairly consistent to previous years however increases associated with enterprise bargaining conditions and other incremental movements have been understated due to the number of vacancies in staffing.

Where do the funds come from?

Council receives some funding in grants from other levels of government and raises some funds in user fees and charges, however approximately 68% of revenue came from the Council Rates in 2022-23.

The pie chart (top right) outlines the areas in which Councils receive funds in a typical year.

How is the money spent?

Council provides many services to the community, some of which are legislated and others which are provided by choice. Many of our services are largely invisible (ie stormwater management, community wastewater management schemes), but are definitely a necessary service provision.

Council's expenses represent the cost of providing these services to the community. Materials, contracts and other expenses made up 45% of the total operating expenditure of Council. Council Employees are its most valuable asset and provide the numerous services for the community at a consistent operating cost of 22% of expenditure. Depreciation makes up 29% of the total operating expenditure.

The pie chart (bottom right) outlines the areas in which Councils spend funds in a typical year.

What assets does Council own?

When looking at the Council Balance Sheet the Council assets totalled \$371 million. This includes money that is owed to Council in the form of Rates and other services (Trade & other receivables), stock on hand (inventories) and for the large proportion


Trade & Other Receivables (Rates – General & Other) is quite large as a result of the outstanding separate rate applied for the Wallaroo Shores Development which includes the outstanding interest applied.

Infrastructure, Property, Plant & Equipment make up Council's non current assets. There was a revaluation of the CWMS & stormwater assets conducted during 2022/23. The revaluation increment of \$22,516,116 is reported in the Statement of Comprehensive Income as Other Comprehensive Income in 2022/23. Additions to these assets from this date have been measured at cost. One of the challenges facing Local Government today is finding the revenue required to maintain the large amount of community infrastructure under its care and control.


Whether a service is a legislative requirement of Councils, or is provided by local choice, the Local Government Act requires that a Council is "responsive to the needs, interests and aspirations of individuals and groups within its community..." and that it must "...seek to ensure that Council resources are used fairly..." (Section 8, (b) and (h)).

What liabilities does Council owe?

Council's liabilities include loans, amounts owing to suppliers, amounts owing to employees for leave entitlements and amounts owing to residents of our retirement villages should they no longer occupy one of our units in Moonta or Wallaroo. Council's borrowings are reported in

the Annual Report and also in the Annual Financial Statements. Each quarter in the budget review a table reporting these borrowings and the associated balance is also provided. The balance is currently \$25.3 million as at 30th June 2023 however it is important to note that this also includes \$4.2 million for the retirement villages licences in Moonta and Wallaroo.

1 January (affecting R1/R2/R3) will push all collections down one day for that week only.

DELAYED COLLECTION DATES
