Council continues to support our local youth through our Traineeship Program.

return of swimming lessons after the Christmas break.


Keep an eye out for our School Holiday Activities, which will include Swim and Play sessions for the family, and Free Kinder Fun sessions for the little ones.

We look forward to continuing to see the community utilise the centre.










Restoration works are continuing on the Kadina Cemetery Wall, with the focus now on the Eastern inside wall.

### **Bay Road Consultation**

As part of the Bay Road Consultation phase, public information sessions were held on Wednesday the 23rd October and Thursday 24th of October. The feedback we received is much appreciated, and has helped shape the Bay Road project as it continues to come to fruition.

In addition, of the 3 original concept plans for Bay Road and the Frances Terrace intersection, Council has adopted Bay Road Concept option 3, and Bay Road/Frances Terrace Intersection Concept option A.

If you haven't seen the designs in detail and wish to, you can view them at either the Moonta Tourist Office, or the

Kadina Council Office. Alternatively, to view the plans in High Resolution, please go to www.coppercoast.sa.gov.au and search 'Bay Road' as the pictures are far too big for viewing in detail in this newsletter.



The concepts will now progress to the detail stage of the process, where residents will again have the opportunity to comment further on the concepts. There will be more information to come on the date for this consultation session when it is confirmed.

#### Road Sealing Program

You can find the full list of roads to be resealed on Council's website.

Other key road projects include a multi-million dollar, multi-year upgrade of Bay Road in Moonta Bay, an expanded rural road resheeting program and a number of smaller road reconstruction projects. The road reseal program commenced on the 24th September 2019 and will be completed within the 2019 calendar year.

We offer these tips to residents during the resealing program:

- Drive slowly watch out for workers and loose road covering
- Where possible avoid driving, walking or riding on resealed areas for at least 24 hours
- Remove footwear before going indoors — tar sticks to everything!

#### Wallaroo Swimming Enclosure

The Wallaroo Swimming Enclosure has not operational as designed for some time. The Council issued an Offer Of Settlement before Action to Seaslip; the business that constructed the Wallaroo Swimming Enclosure. A response has been received from Seaslip solicitors. Council endeavouring to progress and resolve this project as soon as possible.

#### Wallaroo Road Swap -

#### Department of Planning, Transport and Infrastructure (DPTI)

Given the communities interest in improving the current road network around the Wallaroo Central Business District, with a focus on Kadina Road and Victoria Street, Council has been advocating this cause on behalf of its community with the State Government. The intent is to develop a suitable road swap agreement to obtain local control over the key entrance roads to Wallaroo while transferring the heavy vehicle bypass road to DPTI.

### **VICTORIA SQUARE**



The much loved, and highly popular Victoria Square in Kadina is currently undergoing some service upgrades which will help keep the park in immaculate condition all year round. The upgrades include:

- Irrigation and seed laying
- Rotunda restoration works including a paved path surrounding the Rotunda

Council is communicating developments with the Rotary Club of Northern Yorke Peninsula to ensure the Rotary Kadina Markets and future infrastructure supports ongoing activities within the park.

We appreciate your patience throughout the works, and it is fantastic to see the grass coming back as quickly as it has.





### **Cruise Ships visit the Copper Coast**

Wallaroo welcomed its first cruise ship in history when the Vasco da Gama docked on Saturday 7th December. It then returned on 3rd January carrying up to 1200 passengers and 600 crew each visit.

There were many attractions and experiences to be enjoyed on each day including the NYP Rotary Markets held on the John Tce Reserve, local entertainment, shopping incentives, a pop-up Visitor Centre in the old Railway Station providing local tour bookings, souvenirs and local produce and a hop on hop off bus shuttle between Wallaroo, Moonta and Kadina.

With the assistance of more than 90 registered

volunteers the Copper Coast Tourism Team was able to successfully welcome and coordinate the visits showcasing all that we have to offer. Many locals took the opportunity to view the ship from the jetty or the public viewing area set up at the Ferry Terminal Carpark and join in with the activities on offer.

Not only were the visits a great boost for the local economy but also a chance to showcase the region. It is hoped that research trends from other ports will also happen in the Copper Coast with 33 per cent of visitors getting a taste of the region during their cruise ship call and revisiting within the next 2 years for an extended stay.

#### Why STARCLUB?

We are going back to basics to let you know the STARCLUB, through the Office for Recreation, Sport and Racing, has a lot to offer the country club in particular. There are a host of templates available on line to help run your club, for example. No one is saying clubs haven't been organised professionally but there has been so many changes in the past decade clubs need to be aware of those changes and adapt accordingly. We can't stress it's all for the better. The Copper Coast Council oversees nearly 50 STARCLUB registered clubs with grants, advice and opportunities.

The STARCLUB is rolling along beautifully and we're trying to get out to as many clubs as possible. In a lot of ways, I'm starting from scratch despite all the information made available to me by my predecessor.

Working on quite a few projects and have been in contact with the clubs concerned and thank them for their cooperation. There's isn't a STARCLUB group I haven't contacted or tried to make contact with since arriving in October 2019 at the Copper Coast Council. If for some reason you don't believe I have got to you, please forward me all the club's details via email or on the mobile phone.

#### **STARCLUB Updates:**

We are moving away from monthly STARCLUB Newsletters via email and heading towards short video information stories. This type of coverage will also be introduced for events around the Copper Coast as well. Our best form of sending out information is via social media.

Training Courses:

The STARCLUB is about servicing its members and communicating with the Clubs. We often run courses from Child Safe Officer to Responsible Service of Alcohol.

Sports Vouchers are a valuable asset for any youngster wanting to join a sport or dance club. The Sports Voucher program is a Government of South Australia incentive and managed by the Office for Recreation, Sport and Racing. \$100 off your membership/registration fees for all primary school children. In 2019 nearly 650 vouchers were claimed. That equals around \$60,000, and the good news is that the share between girls and boys is close to 50-50. The top 10 Sports include Aussie Rules, Netball, Basketball and Football (Soccer). Heading the list of top 10 Providers is the SANFL. Remember it's a \$100 discount on club membership.

#### **Electronic lodgement of development applications**

Council are now accepting the electronic lodgement of Development Applications. Council see this an opportunity to improve our efficiencies and services to you and ensure the future transition into the new Planning and Design Code is more streamlined.

Council still accepts hard copies of applications although encourage electronic

versions as this will speed up the process for you as the applicant. If you wish to submit applications electronically you can do so via Council's website https://www.coppercoast.sa.gov.au/onlinedevelopmentapplication or via email devadmin@coppercoast.sa.gov.au with the relevant plans and documentation as per usual.





As reported in October this year, the Moonta Masterplan Survey has been finalised. The results from the survey have been collated and WAX Design prepared a

draft Framework that was received by Council at the June Council meeting. The draft Framework was presented at a meeting to the Moonta Traders Group and again made available for final public comment.

The period for commenting has closed and the draft Framework will be finalised and presented to Council early in 2020.



No one is safe from a bushfire. Make sure you are aware of where you can relocate should a bushfire ever threaten you. The CFS have identified places that can offer safety from a bushfire.

**BUSHFIRE SAFER PLACES** is generally metropolitan areas or rural settlement. They are suitable for use when relocating early, or when bad weather is forecasted or during a bushfire. These safer places may be subject to sparks, embers and smoke.

**BUSHFIRE LAST RESORT REFUGE** is typically ovals or buildings in rural areas. You use last resort refuges when your plan has failed. Last resort refuges are not suitable for extended use and provide limited protection during a bushfire.



#### **MOONTA MINES PRECINCT**

The Moonta Mines Precinct was Nationally Heritage listed on 9th May 2017. In order to protect the Heritage status, but also ensure appropriate development within this area, Council applied and received funding of \$88,000 for the development of a Conservation Management Plan. Following a tender process, Swanbury Penglase, Heritage Architects were engaged to undertake this Plan.

Two public information sessions were held at Moonta on 12th and 13th November 2019. Both sessions were well attended and provided good feedback.

It is expected that a draft report will be available in late January or early February 2020. Once the Conservation Management Plan is completed and endorsed by the Federal Government Council and the Moonta National Trust could apply for funding for further development, in accordance with the Conservation Management Plan.



#### DROUGHT FUNDING

The Federal Government has allocated an additional one million dollars under the Drought Communities Programme - Extension. The Council does not determine the branding (drought funding) nor the criteria. This is determined by the Federal Government. The funding is primarily an economic stimulus package for local businesses and contractors.

At the Council meeting held on the 4th December 2019 Council considered projects for potential funding. The Council decided on the following projects:

Moonta Town Hall - \$300,000 Wallaroo Town Hall - \$160,000

V. 1:... 1 ..... \$150.000

Kadina Lagoons -\$150,000

Kadina CBD/Smart Technology - \$153,000

Cemetery Management - \$57,000

Wallaroo Illuminart - \$100,000

Paskeville Storage Tank Enclosure - \$80,000

These projects will be submitted to the Federal Government for approval and all projects must be completed by the 31st December 2020.



### **Financial Summary**

The table to the right is a summary of the audited financial results of Council for the past two years and the adopted budget for 2019-20. The 2017-18 operating surplus was primarily due to a separate rate that was raised for the Wallaroo Shores Development raised against the developer's property. This separate rate was for \$7M and explains the large variance in the rate income during that year to the 2018-19 and 2019-20 years. The Council managed the contract for the construction of the road and the implementation of the Economic Development Marketing Strategy for the Copper Coast, including the subject site. While the rate has been applied in a single year (2017-18), allowances have been made for it to be repaid at the time individual allotments created from the Land are sold for a period up to 6 years.

Work has been completed on both components of this separate rate however the expenditure to 30th June 2018 was only \$1.787M. The variance of \$5.213M is reflected in the operating surplus for the 2017-18 year and the result of this is that the remaining expenditure was spent in 2018-19 and is reflected in the materials, contracts & other expenses line for that year (see table).

Further to the above, Commonwealth Government during June 2019 forwarded to Councils their funding under the Financial Assistance Grants Scheme 50% (\$1,398,863) of their 2019/20 allocation. This payment also included two payments of the supplementary road funding for 2019-20 and 2020-21 of \$162,884 each year. Under the Accounting Standards this income is to be reported in the year of receipt and therefore inflates the Grants, Subsidies, Contributions received for the 2018-19 financial year and also will impact on the 2019-20 and 2020-21 years.

A further adjustment for depreciation of \$269,000 was made in 2018-19 under AASB13 Fair Value Measurement for the residual values of the asset class of Buildings and Other Structures as the remaining values were not previously adjusted when the accounting standards came into effect.

#### Where do the funds come from?

Council receives some funding in grants from other Governments and raise some funds in user fees and charges, however approximately 73% of revenue came from the Council Rates in 2018-19.

The pie chart (below) outlines the areas in which Council receives funds in a typical year.

#### How is the money spent?

Council provides many services to the community, some of which are legislated and others which are provided by choice. Many of our services are largely invisible (ie storm water management, community wastewater management schemes, public lighting), but are definitely a necessary service provision.

Council's expenses represent the cost of providing these services to the community. Materials, contracts and other expenses made up 46% of the total operating expenditure of Council. Council Employees are its most valuable asset and provide the numerous services listed for the community at a consistent operating cost of 20% of expenditure. Depreciation makes up 29% of the total operating expenditure.

Whether a service is a legislative requirement of Councils, or is provided by local choice, the Local Government Act requires that a Council is "responsive to the needs, interests and aspirations of individuals and groups within its community..." and that it must "...seek to ensure that Council resources are used fairly..." (Section 8, (b) and (h)).

#### What assets does Council own?

When looking at the Council Balance Sheet the Council assets totalled \$308 million. This includes money that is owed to Council in the form of Rates and other services (Trade & other receivables), stock on hand (inventories) and for the large proportion Infrastructure, Property, Plant & Equipment. Council's non current assets (Roads & Footpaths, CWMS & Stormwater) were revalued by JLL Infrastructure Advisory Pty Ltd in 2017 at fair value. Infrastructure assets including Buildings will be again revalued during 2019/20. Additions to these assets from this date have been measured at cost. One of the challenges facing Local Government today is finding the revenue required to maintain the large amount of community infrastructure under its care and control.

Trade & Other Receivables is large as a result of the outstanding separate rate for the Wallaroo Shores Development which includes the outstanding interest applied.


#### What liabilities does Council owe?


Council's borrowings are reported in the Annual Report and also in the Annual Financial Statements.


